Mincher said she 30 appreciated the very nice outdoor space they have for programming and for the enjoyment of 31 32 staff and library customers. Some of the observations made during the tour included the 33 insufficient soundproofing, tall ceilings, large windows that cause excessive heat or cold and basement offices with no windows. McVeigh mentioned they did have a shared space with the 34 Historical Society. The Manchester library is private, but they do get annual funding from the 35 Town of Manchester, and this library is brand new and they abandoned the old library and dealt 36 with it after the new library was constructed, and after several years it was sold and converted 37 into a restaurant. Mincher said the woman who does the fund raising for the library has a 38 39 daughter at Middlebury College and is willing to offer advice to the Ilsley Team. 40 Update on Estimator Henry Erickson 41 42 43 Hart said the Selectboard authorized contracting with Erickson, but he will need additional information before he can begin the estimation. She said all of his references were "stellar". 44

## NexBridge EDI Proposal

McVeigh said Khan had obtained the NexBridge EDI site proposal from Town Manager Kathleen Ramsay, and the minutes from the EDI site committee indicated that the proposal was not pursued at that time while they waited for the completion of the Downtown Master Plan.

Harris said the original EDI site had been defined in a certain area, and she wondered if the Selectboard would allow the EDI site to be expanded upon to include both the lower and upper parking areas, and perhaps as an alternate include the existing library site as an adaptive reuse site for the project. She said it seemed that one concern with the previous proposal was that the Town would be losing control to the developer, but in this case the library could be the anchor tenant, could own their own space as in a condominium arrangement, with parking and housing.

 McVeigh asked Khan and Brown what the next step would be with the Selectboard should they decide to include the EDI site as a possibility in the matrix for a new library. Brown said he couldn't speak for the entire Selectboard, but he felt the Board would be receptive to the idea and to just continue to keep them informed, or you could go before them and ask for their opinion. Khan said he felt the Selectboard Chair is receptive to the idea.

Hart questioned the process and if they decided to pursue that site would they need an RFQ for a developer, and would it then become a Town project and not a Library project. She said if they're talking of having a public-private partnership then they need someone with expertise in that process to advise them.

Hart said she and McVeigh will be updating the Selectboard at their September 27<sup>th</sup> meeting, so they can mention the 4 alternatives that includes building a new library on the EDI site, and the possibility of bringing in a private partner. She said she had also met recently with Town Planner Jennifer Murray.

## Review the Draft Narrative of Matrix Options

McVeigh said Harris and Hart have been working to make sure the description of each item is clear.

Doyle-Wilch said one thing that they hadn't included was the importance of outside space and felt that has been ignored somewhat. She said it's mentioned in the matrix, but not as much in the narrative and Mincher agreed. Hart said she understood what they were saying, but the narratives were just describing each option, and weren't meant to evaluate options.

Harris said another item not mentioned in the matrix or narrative is the maintenance cost of each option, such as it will cost more to maintain an old building that's renovated than it will for a new building, and we might want to look at that.

McVeigh said in the option to renovate the existing library, the assumption is that the 1977 and 1988 additions would be torn down. He said he agrees they'd have to come down, but at the time the GAB plans were presented before, some folks in town were very unclear why there was a

need to tear down perfectly good buildings, so they would need to find a way to make it very clear why that would be recommended. Doyle-Wilch said most of the people that she spoke to that were against tearing them down, were people who had helped raise funds to construct those additions, so there is a lot of emotion involved. Harris said that option doesn't necessarily mean the GAB plans will be used.

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> McVeigh said the other assumption is that they were limited to what could be done due to having to remain on this site, but the Town also owns the land behind the library site, so they were not totally constrained to the existing site.

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108 109 Gish said if the library built on the EDI site that would mean loss of property taxes for the Town in the future. Hart said the possibility of those lost tax dollars is one of the decisions the Selectboard will have to make when considering allowing the library build there. There was more discussion on the loss of taxes, and the fact that if it was a mixed-use project with condominiums or commercial property, then there would be tax dollars generated. Harris said that is one of the items in the Order of Magnitude estimate that will not be simple to do. She said Erickson can produce construction estimates, but all those other costs, such as moving the library off site during construction, or purchasing land, are all costs we'll have to present.

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They discussed whether or not to use the former Ben Franklin building as the example in Item C, and decided that even if it sold in the interim, for illustration purposes it would provide an estimated cost to use for a comparison.

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## Review Draft Site Evaluation Matrix

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The Team reviewed the changes to the site evaluations since the last time they'd reviewed them. Doyle-Wilch was concerned that outdoor space wasn't given as much weight as should in the evaluation.

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Mincher said in thinking about all the library designs they'd reviewed in urban areas that were modern and had lots of windows, she said to keep in mind we're a rural area so we need to think about where we are so the design fits the location.

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McVeigh noted the item about green construction had been removed and said the last time he and Hart had presented at the Selectboard meeting, someone from the Energy Committee had quite emphatically said the new building would need to be green and energy efficient. Harris said they'd removed it after speaking to Town Planner Murray who said that it was more of a value that you put in the programing statement, and it's hard to put a score on it without a design in front of them. Hart said it's the Team's responsibility that the building will be green no matter what route they go.

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Hart said they added a line for "Ease of Implementation" to account for the additional steps that certain options might involve, such as purchasing additional property. McVeigh had interpreted it to mean how much disruption would there be to existing library services to accomplish any given option. Harris said that was covered under Community Alignment.

There was concern that the scoring numbers for various options were arbitrary, and that's why 139 140 they'll also be adding the pros and cons of each option. Hart said it isn't science, but it's a subject they're all very familiar with and thinks there is real value in their scoring. 141

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McVeigh asked the Team to go through the matrix before the next meeting and put their scores for each item and to also write down the pros and cons and send them to him.

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## Public Outreach

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McVeigh said they had talked of ways of reaching out to the public, and Hardy and Doyle-Wilch had stressed the importance of "sharing the vision". He asked how they would go about disseminating the information. Doyle-Wilch said she felt putting out information wasn't helpful, you need to ask the public their opinion and input. She said people want to be heard and feel better if they can offer their opinion.

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Mincher felt it had to be done in several different ways, through public meetings, social media, and Gish's blog. She said it needs to be shared in a way people can react and you can't do that with just a website or power-point presentation.

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They discussed what they would bring to the public and was there more they needed to do before presenting the options. McVeigh and Hart both thought they should first go to the public with their programming needs.

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Gish said for the downtown project they had a town meeting dedicated to only that project and it was well attended, and he thought the library should hold a similar town meeting only about the library, and they could use the theme "The New Ilsley". He said they could share the program the staff has put together and highlight the deficiencies of the existing building but make it about the new vision and make it very positive, as well as informational, and to feature the amount of work that's already gone into it. He said the harder decisions will come down the road, but now would be a time to get people really excited about it. Harris suggested breakout areas where they could go to learn about different aspects of the plans, such as the children's area or the community room, and they could also share the design ideas the Team has looked at from other libraries as inspiration of what we could do.

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Gish said it's possible there will be a lot of people that will want to keep the library in the current building, like they did with keeping the Town Offices in the old high school, and they'll probably hear about the Ben Franklin, but it will be a good way to flush out community concerns.

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They discussed ideas of ways to present the vision and options and decided to have two meetings and present the program and vision at the first meeting, and then share the options at the 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting. Possible locations were discussed and whether to have it in a neutral location, or to have it in the library, and looked at possible dates. Tentative dates are Thursday, October 27<sup>th</sup> at 7 pm for the first meeting, and Wednesday, November 16<sup>th</sup> at 7 pm for the second meeting.

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McVeigh said he is wondering if it comes down to two possible options how would they choose between the two. Harris suggested putting out a Request for Proposals (RFP) to designers to come up with proposals for the EDI site and the existing site and then take those designs to the public, and the Team was in support of that idea. Harris said Town Manager Ramsay had suggested that White + Burke would be a good source for help preparing an RFP. Gish will work on preparing a draft of a presentation and suggested they have a slide show with all the photos they've seen of other libraries. McVeigh suggested a good graphic design that could be carried out throughout the project. Various ideas for the presentation and who to invite was discussed, and the meeting adjourned at 11:56 a.m. Respectfully submitted, Beth Dow
